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Ideas for the Community and School

Posters and Collages

Ask each student to make a poster or collage that demonstrates healthy habits and relationships:

- ◆ Depict what friendship means to you.
- ◆ Depict an adult role model that is in your life.
- ◆ Illustrate what family means to you.
- ◆ Depict a quality you see in others which you would like to have in yourself.
- ◆ Illustrates a safe place where you like to go.
- ◆ Illustrate kids being kind to each other.
- ◆ Depict how you can be helpful to others, not just with students, but with adults as well.
Illustrate empathetic faces and positive emotions.
- ◆ Depict peaceful moments and what you think of when you think of being peaceful.
Illustrate what bullying means to you or what experiences you have with bullying.

T-Shirt and Hat Booth

Communicate your messages right on your clothes! Have your students write and draw their very own bullying prevention messages on t-shirts or hats you provide. Be sure to give them sample slogans or messages and provide bright, colorful permanent markers so they can design eye-catching, original clothing!

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Graffiti Mural

A great way to get the word out about bullying prevention at your school. All it takes is a long roll of paper and colored markers to make a graffiti mural—it's that simple!

Contact the art teacher at your school, community center or local business and ask if you can cover a wall with poster paper. You may want to see if your city or a business will donate an actual wall for this cause. Try to get a wall that people frequently walk by so that your mural can be seen by many.

Describe ideas about what sorts of positive things you'd like people to write on the wall.

Make sure you keep a close watch on the wall as the days go by to make sure everything written on it is appropriate.

Create a Pledge Wall

Bullying doesn't just affect the student who is being bullied or the student who is bullying, but rather everyone in the school community. That's why it is important to make sure that EVERYONE – students, teachers, and parents – are on the same page to help stop bullying. Organize a pledge wall at your school for your students to pledge that they will make a commitment to stop bullying, help students who are being bullied, or stop others from bullying.

Take lots of pictures and pass them on to your local newspaper or television station to let others know about your efforts. This is your chance to show everyone that there is no tolerance for bullying in your community and that everyone should pledge to help **BOX OUT BULLYING!**

Chalk It Up!

Write bullying prevention messages on sidewalks with sidewalk chalk. Think of frequented public spaces such as local parks, school front, etc.

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
